Hi, mate! I've come across your question while browsing this forum. As I'm an (avid) **seasoned** traveller myself, I'd be happy to share my knowledge and give you a piece of advice.

Surely, **the** choice between Edinburgh and Glasgow is a tough one. Yet, I'll try and weigh up the options.<sup>1</sup>

Talking about the Scottish capital, I can say it boasts innumerable places of interest. Some of them include: the National Museum of Scotland that can't leave anyone unamazed thanks to its Dolly the cloned sheep; the Scottish National Gallery housing works of Raphael and Boticcelli; the Royal Botanic Garden, a giant lily pond of which is a sight to behold.

On the other hand, it'd be wrong to say Glasgow has less to take pride in. For example, the Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum's dinosaurs are known for having mesmerized people for decades. What's more, visiting the Glasgow Science Centre and the Riverside Museum has become a long-standing tradition with tourists.

'But which one is a better destination?' you might ask. Well, there's no obvious answer. However, having first-hand knowledge of the cities, I advise you to go to Edinburgh. Firstly, it has a more advanced subway system, which makes it (comfortable) **convenient**<sup>2</sup> to get around. Secondly, it is a place where nature flourishes since local authorities care for trees and fund the upkeep of numerous parks.

So, Glasgow is wonderful, of course, but Edinburgh's splendours are what I'd recommend you to see first.
